


Context

- 7.48 million children in need of humanitarian assistance in 2024
- More than 6 million children at heightened risk of violence, abuse, neglect, and exploitation and need critical child protection services.
- School drop out rates on the rise, with age of school drop out as low as 11
- Child Labor: All of Syria estimated 32%, 54.73% (Deir Ezzor) and 59.63% (Aleppo) of households, respectively, report having a child under 18 engaged in labor.
- 3,700 schools in need of rehabilitation or repair.
- Estimated 75% of children in detention survivers of exploitation and neglect

General overview

Children in Syria are disproportionately impacted by the ongoing crisis. In areas controlled by the Government of Syria (GoS), the most prevalent child protection risks include school dropout, child labor, child marriage, and children living on the streets. Child labor has increased by 20% across Syria compared to 2022, with significant spikes in Deir Ez-Zor and Aleppo. Adolescent girls are at higher risk of child marriage, and both girls and women are exposed to sexual harassment on the streets and sexual exploitation. The mental health and wellbeing of children and their families continue to deteriorate, with widespread violence within families and against children, fueled by multiple traumas, negative coping mechanisms, and economic distress among caregivers. These vulnerabilities, coupled with a lack of services, may drive children into conflict with the law or encourage engagement in other risky behaviors or delinquency. Additionally, an estimated 75% of detained children are homeless, neglected, or victims of commercial sexual exploitation or organized crime. By international standards, these children should not be in detention settings.

Results

In Kind assistance and school rehabilitation

- 3 schools rehabilitated, including classrooms and WASH facilities, benefitting 3149 children and teachers
- 1923 families provided with family hygiene kits, 1,497 dignity kits, and 475 baby diapers, benefitting 8812 earthquake-affected children and their family members

Training, awareness sessions, and direct services

- 30 teachers and 39 staff of local partner organizations trained on child protection minimum standards.
- 3074 students reached with awareness sessions on waterborne disease and good hygiene practices.
- 328 children and adults reached through child protection awareness sessions.
- 96 frontline workers from partner organizations supported through peer-to-peer staff care sessions and one-on-one MHPSS sessions based on needs.
- 134 children in detention supported with basic services, including legal aid, nonformal education, and group PSS sessions, in collaboration with partner SSSD

Emergency Intervention: Earthquake Response

In response to the **devastating February 2023 earthquakes** in northern Syria, Tdh and its Syrian partners, the Syrian Society for Social Development (SSSD) and Mosaic for Human Relief and Development (Mosaic), initiated a multiphase project in Aleppo and Lattakia governorates. .

This effort provided substantial aid to those affected: 1,923 families received family hygiene kits, 1,497 dignity kits, and 475 baby diapers, benefiting 8,812 children and their family members. Additionally, 96 frontline workers from partner organizations received peer-to-peer staff care and one-on-one MHPSS sessions based on their needs. This program pilots an approach to support frontline workers dealing with high stress, enhancing their capacity and stress management skills and providing access to psychological support when needed.

In the second phase (2023-2024), mobile **Child Protection and WASH teams** address urgent needs of the most vulnerable and underserved populations, including **quality WASH facilities in schools**, **psychosocial support**, **and recreational activities for out-of-school children**.

Furthermore, Tdh ensures the inclusion of children and caregivers with disabilities by training staff with a disability and inclusion specialist and adapting MHPSS methodologies accordingly.

Advocacy

Tdh advocates for the rights and protection of children in detention, including securing funding for critical needs and promoting child-friendly legal frameworks and institutional guidelines.

Outlook

Tdh aims to solidify its position as a key player in child protection in Syria. Future efforts will focus on:

- Strengthening robust child protection systems, including efficient referral mechanisms and potential CPICMS rollout.
- Leading and participating in humanitarian working groups on localization, case management, and prevention.
- Enhancing localization through strategic partnerships offering technical support and targeted capacity building
